
Wildebeests are also known in the world as Gnus.

Wildebeest Calves are born between January and March at the beginning of the wet season.



They grow inside their Mama for just over eight months.



Calves are very heavy when they are born – weighing up to 49 lbs or 22 kg.



It only takes a young calf a few minutes to learn to walk.



In just a few days they walk alongside the herd with their Mamas.



The young calf likes to drink from his Mama for up to nine months.



Between sixteen months and seven years, the young bull calf will have his own baby calves.



A Wildebeests' life span can be up to and around twenty years.



Both the Black and the Blue Wildebeest are similar to regular cattle with their horns and toes.



The Male Wildebeest is usually larger than the female wildebeest.



They are born with hair.



Their muzzles are broad.



They have white or black tails.



Their manes are shaggy.



Their noses have high bridges – known as Roman noses.



The Wildebeest likes low hills and mountainous regions as well as grasslands and open plains.




Today, Wildebeests are not able to roam across large landscapes because of fencing and roads.







The Wildebeest's main enemies in the animal world are African wild dogs, cheetahs, hyenas and lions.




People all over the world like to come and see the Wildebeest in their natural habitat.

There will be more books on animals coming in the future.


